The LES has an abundance of offerings, particularly when it


comes to food and music. Who needs candy when you can get the most legendary pastrami sandwich in New York?!

Designer everything is a must, even for your dog's leash. Not into it? You can still come to enjoy some of the best art museums in the world.




#6 CHINATOWN


#7 FINANCIAL DISTRICT
